## **Course Description**

This course has **no prerequisites**. This course introduces students to basic algebraic techniques, in particular, as they apply to the solution of equations and systems of equations. Topics include algebraic operations, linear and quadratic equations, simultaneous equations, inequalities, polynomials, rational expressions, factorization, exponents, and radicals. Emphasis is placed on the solutions of verbal problems. The course is intended to remediate weakness in a student's high school math background. *Does not count toward total credit required for graduation.*

This manual provides worked-out, step-by-step solutions to the odd-numbered problems in the text. This gives you the information you need to truly understand how these problems are solved.

Note that presentation of your results is very important. Be clear when communicating your answers. At the top of each assignment you should write your full name, the date, and the homework number. If there are multiple sheets they must be stapled. Scratch paper will be not be accepted. Paper with frays that have not been removed will not be accepted.

## **Quizzes and Exams**

**Examinations:** There will be three in-class midterms, and the tentative dates and content of these exams are displayed above. The final exam will be cumulative, and its time and location have yet to be determined.

Make-up exams will be given only under exceptional circumstances (e.g. illness, mandatory religious obligations, certain university activities, or unavoidable circumstances). All exams are closed-book, closed-notes.

**Quizzes:** Quizzes will be given every Friday at the beginning of class. All of these quizzes will be based on problems from the homework assignments.

Quiz make-ups will be allowed only for official University events or a documented medical emergency. It is your responsibility to contact me to arrange a time to make-up a missed quiz. Make-ups must be completed within one week of the missed quiz. To qualify for a makeup in the case of an official university event (sporting event, field trip, etc.) your supervising professor/coach must confirm your intended participation via letter or e-mail BEFORE the day of the quiz. You will need to provide a doctor's note as soon as possible to be considered for a makeup quiz in the case of medical emergency. To cover all other contingencies (illness, oversleeping, etc.) the two lowest quiz scores will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Make-up policies for exam and quizzes: The make-up exams/quizzes will be given only under exceptional circumstances (e.g. illness, mandatory religious obligations, official University activities, or unavoidable circumstances). Make-ups must be completed within one week of the missed exam/quiz. To qualify for a makeup in the case of an official university event (sporting event, field trip, etc.) your supervising professor/coach must confirm your intended participation via letter or e-mail BEFORE the day of the exam. If you miss an exam/quiz due to illness, you should contact your instructor as soon as possible as well as submit the <a href="mailto:absence form">absence form</a> through the Registrar website. If you miss more than one exam/quiz due to illness, medical documentation should be presented.

## A Word about the Date and Time of the Final Exam:

The final examination date and time will be announced by the Registrar generally by the fifth week of classes. All students should plan on being at the UI through the final examination period, which is December 12 through December 16, 2016. Once the Registrar has announced the date, time, and location of each final exam, the complete schedule will be published on the Registrar's web site and will be shared with instructors and students. Do not make your end of the semester travel plans until the final exam schedule is made public. It is the student's responsibility to know the date, time, and place of the final exam.

#### **Course Policies**

Attendance: Attendance will be taken regularly. Absences will only be excused for medical or family emergency reasons, a university-sanctioned field trip or the observance of a religious holiday. If you miss a class due to illness, you should submit the <a href="mailto:absence form">absence form</a> through the Registrar website. If you miss more than five days of classes you should be able to provide a record of appointments or documentation from a health care provider.

You are allowed to have three unexcused absences without a penalty; each subsequent unexcused absence will lower your overall grade by 0.5%. If you miss a class, you are still responsible for the material discussed in class and for all the announcements made in class.

Participation in class discussions: I highly recommend that students make use of opportunities to ask questions in class or present problems to the class when offered. True learning is born from consistent questioning.

Timely completion of assignments: Late homework may be submitted by the next day of class for half credit. Any assignments that are later than one class will not be graded. Late assignments may be submitted directly to me or to my mailbox by 4:30P.

*Calculators*: Unless otherwise indicated, no calculators or other hand-held electronic devices are allowed on exams or quizzes. Exams and quizzes are written in such a way that a calculator is not necessary.

Student Collaboration: The homework in this course is designed to help you master your knowledge related to the topics covered during lecture. That being said, you may work on the homework problems with others or use online resources. However, it is crucial to note that mastery of algebra comes only from significant practice. Cutting corners on homework assignments may leave you significantly vulnerable during quizzes and exams.

Other Expectations of Student Performance: Expect to spend at least 6 hours weekly outside of the classroom doing the assignments. More time may be needed to prepare for exams.

Late arrivals and the use of electronic devices are generally considered disrespectful actions toward both the instructor and the students in the class. As a result, I kindly ask you to refrain from such activities. If such actions become disruptive, you may be asked to leave.

#### **Resources for Students**

Math Tutorial Lab: The Math Tutorial Lab offers free tutorial services for the course material. Participation is optional, but strongly recommended. It is located in 125 MLH and it is staffed by teaching assistants from the Department of Mathematics.
